Good conservation practices for the Kentish Plover on the Canary Island coastline



The Kentish plover (Charadrius alexandrinus) is a widely distributed shorebird that has been particularly hard hit by recent swingeing changes to the coastline.

In the Canary Islands in particular its range has shrunk by about 42% in the last decade, **disappearing as a breeder in Tenerife and tottering on the verge of extinction in Gran Canaria**. Some, however, are still hanging on in Fuerteventura and Lobos, as well as Lanzarote and La Graciosa.



Threats



Habitat degradation, destruction or fragmentation.



People and vehicles straying off the tracks and trampling nests.



Public use of beaches during the breeding season.



Certain sporting activities (kitesurfing, quadbikes, motocross, cross-country running, etc).



Invasive species and uncontrolled pets disturbing or preying on the birds, their chicks and eggs (unleashed dogs, feral cats and rats).





Illicit camping.
